It is humbling to hear that the Sisouphanh family is celebrating their 40th anniversary in the United States this year. Through many obstacles, my family managed to buy less than an acre of land that cost around \$12,000 at the time. And at this time my grandfather was only making \$3.75 per hour. This small home of theirs carries numerous memories from four generations. But the thing is, I always wondered how different the house would be laid out if it were built for my family today. How would the architect manage to fit a family of ten into a 1,150 square foot home? How well would our growing family fit in this small home if we moved the walls, windows, and doors to create a new space? Would the space encourage more interaction? Or would it create privacy? How efficient would our everyday routines be with an appropriate and functional space? Growing up in a single family home with increasing numbers certainly influenced me to be spatially aware. Rightfully so, architecture has always been at the back of my mind. I spent time searching for who I wanted to be in this world and somehow my mind always traced back to the idea of innovating and designing. Fortunately, I had the opportunity to receive a higher education, something that my aunts and uncles did not have access to. I am proud to say that I am a first generation college student striving to be the first architect in my family. My grandparents and their motivation to overcome adversity are a huge reason why I continue to strive. This strong quality lies in our DNA.
